SUMMARY OF IMPORTANT LEGISLATION AND EMERGENCY ORDERS AND DIRECTIVES:

Below we provide an overview as to the types of legislative actions that have been occurring, both on a federal and state level:

- In the U.S., <u>393 million vaccine doses</u> have been administered. In the last week, an average of 725,777 vaccine doses per day were administered.
 - o Enough vaccine doses have been administered to fully vaccinate <u>40.8%</u> of the global population.
- President Biden received a third dose of the Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 vaccine. The
 president's booster comes just a week after the CDC and FDA approved additional doses
 for 60 million individuals ages 65 and above, and adults with underlying health conditions.
- The <u>Biden administration</u> promised historic investments across the arc of the educational system as part of the "Build Back Better" proposal.
- Pharmaceutical company <u>Merck</u> announced that its experimental COVID-19 medication reduced hospitalizations and death by half in people recently infected. Merck will soon ask health officials to authorize its use.
- The <u>CDC</u> provided additional evidence that school mask requirements help keep children safe in classrooms, showing lower spikes in pediatric COVID-19 cases and fewer school outbreaks in places that require them.
- A new <u>survey</u> published by the Kaiser Family Foundation found that more parents were willing to vaccinate their children in mid-September than were willing to do so in July.
- <u>Rural Americans</u> are dying of COVID-19 at more than twice the rate of their urban counterparts. According to health experts, the divide may widen as access to medical care shrinks for a population that tends to be older, sicker, heavier, poorer, and less vaccinated.
- According to a new <u>report</u>, children may not be able to receive a Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine until November.
- Associate Supreme Court Justice <u>Brett Kavanaugh</u> tested positive for COVID-19 ahead of the start of the Supreme Court's new term on October 4, 2021.



- <u>Massachusetts</u> announced it is extending the statewide school mask mandate through at least November 1, 2021.
- Acting Boston Mayor <u>Kim Janey</u> shared good news that Boston's rates of COVID-19 infections are declining and vaccination rates among the city workforce are rising.
 - The positivity rate in Boston is 3% and there are no neighborhoods with a positive rate over 8%.
- Effective May 29, 2021, <u>Massachusetts</u> lifted all COVID-19 industry restrictions. Face coverings are still required while using public and private transportation as well as in facilities housing vulnerable populations.
 - o <u>Boston's</u> mask mandate for indoor public settings took effect on August 27, 2021.
 - o The new mandate does include exemptions for places of worship including churches, temples, and synagogues, though acting Mayor Kim Janey's administration strongly urges faith communities to wear masks indoors.
- New Hampshire released Universal Best Practices which replaced all existing "Safer at Home 2.0" business operations guidance put in place in March 2020.
 - O Governor Chris Sununu closed both the State Emergency Operations Center and Joint Information Center on June 30, 2021. Ongoing pandemic operations transitioned to the New Hampshire Department of Health and Human Services.
- Maine lifted all capacity limits and physical distancing requirements in outdoor and indoor settings, individuals who are not vaccinated are urged to continue wearing face masks.
 - o Governor Janet Mills ended Maine's State of Civil Emergency on June 30, 2021.
 - The <u>Mills administration</u> announced that the state of Maine will follow CDC updated face covering guidelines. All counties have high levels of community transmission at this time.
 - The <u>Mills administration</u> announced that it will begin enforcement of its COVID-19 vaccination requirement for health care workers on October 29, 2021, providing an additional month for healthcare works to complete their vaccination protocol.
- As of May 19, 2021, all <u>Connecticut</u> business sector rules enacted to prevent the spread of COVID-19 have been lifted with the exception of certain mask requirements.
 - Effective August 5, 2021, Connecticut municipal leaders have the option of requiring masks to be worn in indoor public places within their respective towns and cities, regardless of vaccination status.



INSURANCE AND COVERAGE RELATED NEWS AND ORDERS/LEGISLATION:

Below we provide an update as to regulations, news, and litigation specifically related to insurance and potential coverage.

- A <u>three-judge federal appellate panel</u> recently ruled in favor of Acuity Insurance Co. after an Ohio restaurant owner sued the insurer under is commercial property insurance seeking reimbursement for lost income as a result of the statewide COVID-19 shutdowns.
- One in <u>four</u> companies has instituted a vaccine mandate for U.S. workers, a sharp increase from last month, following President Biden's directive ordering large employers to require shots or weekly testing.

BUSINESS AND COMMERCE NEWS AND LEGISLATION RELATED TO COVID-19:

Below we discuss news regarding the economic impact of COVID-19 and measures being taken to address that.

- The <u>SBA</u> announced that supplemental award notifications have begun for eligible applicants this week through the Shuttered Venue Operators Grant (SVOG) program.
- The <u>SBA</u> issued a statement in response to a Government Accountability Office (GAO) report that found that critical changes to the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) had the intended effect of increasing loan access for the smallest and minority-owned businesses that were largely left out of earlier funding.
- The <u>IRS</u> announced that starting October 28, 2021, a new \$67.00 user fee will apply to any estate that requests a closing letter for its federal estate tax return.
- The <u>IRS</u> announced the selection of seven new members of the Electronic Tax Administration Advisory Committee (ETAAC). The committee's goal is to promote paperless filing of tax and information returns.
- The <u>U.S. Department of the Treasury's Federal Insurance Office</u> (FIO) released its Annual Report on the insurance industry. Under the Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection act, the FIO must report annually to the President and Congress on the state of the insurance industry.

LITIGATION/CIVIL JUSTICE SYSTEM UPDATES AND ORDERS:

Below we, highlight additional judicial orders and trends related to the COVID-19 pandemic.

• The <u>Supreme Court's</u> new term begins Monday October 4, 2021, and will resume holding inperson oral arguments. The court will remain closed to the public until further notice.



- As of May 18, 2021, all <u>New Hampshire</u> courts clerks' offices in all courts and committees' offices are open to the public. Face coverings are not required; though unvaccinated individuals are urged to wear a mask.
- Beginning June 1, 2021, the <u>Connecticut</u> Judicial Branch resumed summoning jurors to courthouses throughout the state to restart the jury trial process. No person is permitted to enter a Judicial Branch courthouse or facility without a face covering. All Judicial Branch Law Libraries reopened to patrons on June 16, 2021.
- Effective August 16, 2021, members of the public, regardless of vaccination status, must wear an approved face mask while inside a <u>Maine</u> courthouse or other Judicial Branch facility.
- Effective July 12, 2021, <u>Massachusetts</u> lifted all capacity limits and restrictions on jury trials. On July 1, 2021, the Supreme Judicial Court passed two orders that rolled back or amended COVID-19 era policies. All participants, regardless of vaccination status, will be required to wear a mask and some proceedings will continue to take place remotely.
